Buildings in the surrounding blocks are 2- and 3-story 19th-century multi-family homes and neighborhood commerical structures, with a few 20th-century infill buildings. • Other notable features of building or site (Interior and/ or Exterior) This building is a severely simple 2-story brick flat-roofed structure 4 bays wide, with overhead garage doors in the ground floor bays of the north facade. The doors are glazed with slender metal mullions and 24 lights each. The second floor has large window openings corresponding to the garage bays, glazed with metal-framed sash, each opening having three panels of fixed over awning sash. The uppermost light has been replaced with an opaque panel. Metal upper-case block lettering applied to the brick facade above the door openings spells out the equipment unit names. The side facades are two stories high at the north portion of the building and step down to 1-story height at the rear (south). There are five single window openings on each side at both floor levels, with metal-framed fixed sash over awnings. The central opening on the west facade has a door and fire escape. A brick chimney is located at the south facade. The roof line is devoid of ornament, terminating in a clay tile cap. Architect Charles H. Abramowitz Builder • Historical or Architectural importance: This fire station building replaced three earlier stations - one at the same location, one on East Pearl Street, and another on Water Street which was demolished for construction of the Connecticut Turnpike (I-95). This stripped-down industrial-styled building matched the style of several other public safety structures of the time, such as the service buildings at the City Landfill on Middletown Avenue. The severity and avoidance of ornament here contrasted with an earlier generation of firehouses designed in Victorian styles with arched windows and turrets. Shortly after the construction of the Lombard Street station, during the Redevelopment period of the 1960s, the City would build a collection of a half-dozen new stations combining functionalism with attention to the symbolism of the firehouse as an examplar of public safety in the neighborhood context (see Inventory forms for 952 Grand Avenue and 125 Goffe Street). Architect: Charles H.
