# 17. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior):

St. Raphael's Hospital occupies an oversized city block and is comprised of many units and buildings constructed since the turn of the century. Each unit was built with distinction and refinement. Although of widely divergent styles and materials, they appear as a "neighborly civic complex." (Brown, p.78) The hospital dominates the area, but by keeping its height in scale with the prominent nearby church and by being composed of many units, it does not overwhelm the area.

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## 18. HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

St. Raphael's was organized in 1906 as the Catholic Hospital Association of New Haven. Soon thereafter, the Association purchased the F.H. Barnes property, 1442. Chapel Street. Its neighbor was the Grace Hospital which opened in 1892 in the Mr. Burton Malloy estate. Both hospitals doubled their sizes with additions and wings. St. Raphael's opened a building in 1908, a wing in 1908 & 1918 and a pavillion in 1926, which was replaced in 1936. In 1938, a half-million dollar expansion program (Louis Walsh, architect) necessitated the razing of neighboring structures, residences and (cont'd)

In 1945, Grace Hospital joined the New Haven Hospital to form Grace-New Haven Hospital. The former sold its units to the state. Later, St. Raphael's expanded to include the old Grace Hospital buildings.

Today's hospital is the product of organic growth from a small Catholic organization concerned with health care to a major hospital serving the needs of the New Haven area.
